A Note from the Pastor:

After my first parish council meeting, I just wanted to share a few thoughts with you here about the work of God being done here in Frankfort:

First, a very practical one. We have bats in the attic of the Church, similar to the school last year, and we are having the same company take care of them. We looked at several options, and the best to myself and the council was their bid of \$3,800 for the bat removal (this is favorable to the \$4,400 for the gym), and \$3,924 for an insulation that will take care of the bat guano and bugs in the attic, as

well as pay for itself with a lower heating bill.

The longer term items are how to best provide education for the kids (i.e. what to do with the school) and how to best reach out to fallen away Catholics/non-Catholics in the area. Stay tuned for more on that!

Making Christ' Presence real

To emphasize the importance of the spiritual game plan, and to help those who for whatever reason didn't get a bulletin last week, I'm printing an expanded edition of ideas that can form the core of your spiritual game plan, how each of us can make Christ's presence tangible, both personal and as a family:

Growing as a disciple is a lot like growing corn: you need regular SON-light and the rain of grace so you don't die. Here are the necessary, and then many optional ways, to continue growing as a disciple of Jesus.

Precepts are things that we are obliged to do as Catholics at a minimum. I begin the game plan with these 1) because they are all familiar and 2) they may not be as well known as they should be.

Precepts of the Church: The first precept: You shall attend Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation and rest from servile labor requires the faithful to sanctify the day commemorating the Resurrection of the Lord.

The **second** precept: You shall confess your sins at least once a year ensures preparation for the Eucharist by the reception of the sacrament of reconciliation, which continues Baptism's work of conversion and forgiveness.

The **third** precept: You shall receive the sacrament of the Eucharist at least during the Easter season.

The **fourth** precept: You

shall observe the days of fasting and abstinence established by the Church help us acquire mastery over our instincts and freedom of heart.

The **fifth** precept: You shall help to provide for the needs of the Church, each according to his own ability.

If you already have these down, try:

Eucharist-Daily Mass,

Adoration,

Visits to the Blessed Sacrament,

Spiritual communion

Forgive at least one person a week!

Also, regular confession: picking one sin at a time, examen yourself daily, confess regularly, and watch the growth unfold!

Daily Prayer-Before/After Meals, Morning Offering, Night prayers, Divine Office

Mental prayer, including: Devotion to the Sacred Heart;

ROSARY!!!,

Litanies, Novenas (esp. St. Therese of Lisiuex), Divine Mercy Novena/Chaplet, wearing the scapular, keeping a holy water fount by the front door.

Pilgrimages or Retreats

Reflecting On Sunday's Readings

Decision making is difficult, so difficult that bookstore shelves are bursting with management books offering tools on how to make necessary decisions in a timely manner. Some have built an entire career on helping others move through the decision making process. Yet with all this help, when it comes to making spiritual decisions that have life shaping magnitude there is really very little available, except spiritually reworked secular tools. Perhaps this is so because these life-changing decisions are more a decision of the heart than of the head. After all, how reasonable is it, humanly speaking, to decide to follow Jesus if it is going to require your life? And whether we are called to be actual martyrs or not, Jesus asks nothing less than our life.

On July 17, 1794, sixteen innocent Carmelite nuns were asked to make just such a decision. Instructed by the terrorists of the French Revolution's Reign of Terror, to abandon their religious habits and religious calling they decided, not to do so, but to follow their Lord. This unwillingness to abandon their faith and deny their Lord resulted in these nuns being declared enemies of society, arrested, tried, and led to the guillotine to be sacrificed on the altar of political correctness. It is

reported that they went to their deaths singing Psalm 117, "Extol Him all you people! For great is His steadfast love toward us and the faithfulness of the Lord endures forever. Praise the Lord!" Theirs was not a spur of the moment decision but the natural, or rather supernatural, outworking of an earlier decision in their lives to give themselves to Jesus, heart and soul.

The disciples are faced with a similar decision in this week's Gospel reading. As we have seen in the last two weeks, Jesus confronted those who were following him with just two alternatives; either he is God living among them, Emmanuel, or he isn't; either he is the only means of salvation, or he isn't; either they believe and receive him, as demonstrated by their receiving his flesh and blood, or they totally reject him. Jesus offered no third choice, it was either/or. Do not be deceived. the people knew that acceptance of Jesus in this way meant a total break from the religious norm and that for many it would result in ostracism. persecution, and martyrdom. Though at this time we live in a country where the results of choosing to be Jesus' follower are less severe for most of us, the decision is no less demanding. We don't have a third choice of simply choosing to be a morally good religious person. The decision Jesus calls for is still total identification with him and

abandonment to him as our only God, our only means of salvation, and our only source of life. This is a decision which does not simply deal with ideas, but with the outworking of these truths in sacrificial living.

Some foolishly put off making this decision, planning to make this necessary decision later in life. In the meantime they plan on being their own god, calling the shots in their life, and living as they please. Bishop Sheen tells of just such a man who lived as he wanted, claiming that on his death bed he could cry three magic words, "Lord have mercy!" and be saved in the end. Well, he did get his three last words, but they were different than he supposed, for as his horse threw him over a cliff to his death he was heard to proclaim, "I'll be damned!" This is the hour of decision, as Joshua said, "Choose this day whom you will serve." "From the outset, conversion is expressed in faith which is total and

expressed in faith which is total and radical, and which neither limits not hinders God's gift. At the same time, it gives rise to a dynamic and lifelong process which demands a continual turning away from the 'life according to the flesh' to 'life according to the Spirit,' (cf Rom. 8:3-13). Conversion means accepting by a personal decision the saving sovereignty of Christ and becoming his disciple."

The Pope on Marriage

To supplement the half of the homily on marriage, here are the words of Pope Francis from the May 6th Audience in Rome, from the Vatican website: *Dear Brothers and Sisters, Good morning,*

In our journey of catecheses on the family, today we touch directly *on the beauty of Christian marriage*. It is not merely a ceremony in a church, with flowers, a dress, photographs.... Christian marriage is a sacrament that takes place *in* the Church, and which also *makes* the Church, by giving rise to a new family community. It is what the Apostle Paul says in his celebrated expression: "This mystery is a profound one, and I am saying that it refers to Christ and the church" (Eph 5:32). Inspired by the Holy Spirit, Paul says that the love between spouses is an image of the love between Christ and his Church. An unimaginable dignity! But in fact it is inscribed in the creative design of God, and with the grace of Christ innumerable Christian couples, with all their limitations and sins, have realized it! St Paul, speaking of new life in Christ, says that Christians — each one of them — are called to love one another as Christ has loved them, that is to "be subject to one another" (Eph 5:21), which means be at the service of one another. And here he introduces an analogy between husband-wife and Christ-Church. It is clear that this is an imperfect analogy, but we must take it in the spiritual sense which is very lofty and revolutionary, and at the same time simple, available to every man and woman who entrust themselves to the grace of God.

Husbands — Paul says — must love their wives "as their own body" (Eph 5:28); to love them as Christ "loved the Church and gave himself up for her" (v. 25). You husbands who are present here, do you love your wives as Christ loves the Church? The effect of this radical devotion asked of man, for the love and dignity of woman, following the example of Christ, must have been tremendous in the Christian community itself.

The sacrament of marriage is a great act of faith and love: a witness to the courage to believe in the beauty of the creative act of God and to live that love that is always urging us to go on. The Christian vocation to love unconditionally and without limit is what is also at the foundation of the free consent that constitutes marriage.

The Church herself is fully involved in the story of every Christian marriage: she is built on their successes and she suffers in their failures. But we must ask in all seriousness: do we ourselves as believers and as pastors, accept deep down this indissoluble bond of the history of Christ and his Church with the history of marriage and the human family? Are we seriously ready to take up this responsibility, that is, that every marriage goes on the path of the love that Christ has for the Church? This is a great thing! In the depths of this mystery of creation, acknowledged and restored in its purity, opens a second great horizon that marks the sacrament of marriage. The decision to "wed in the Lord" also entails a missionary dimension, which means having at heart the willingness to be a medium for God's blessing and for the Lord's grace to all. Christian spouses participate as spouses in the mission of the Church. The life of the Church is enriched every time by the beauty of this spousal covenant, and deteriorates every time it is disfigured. The Church, in order to offer to all the gifts of faith, hope and love, needs the courageous fidelity of spouses to the grace of their sacrament! The People of God need their daily journey in faith, in love and in hope, with all the joys and the toils that this journey entails in a marriage and a family.

The route is well marked forever, it is the route of love: to love as God loves, forever. Christ does not cease to care for the Church: he loves her always, he guards her always, as himself. Christ does not cease to remove stains and lines of every kind from the human face. Moving and very beautiful to see is this radiation of God's power and tenderness which is transmitted from couple to couple, family to family. May God bless them a thousand times over for this!
